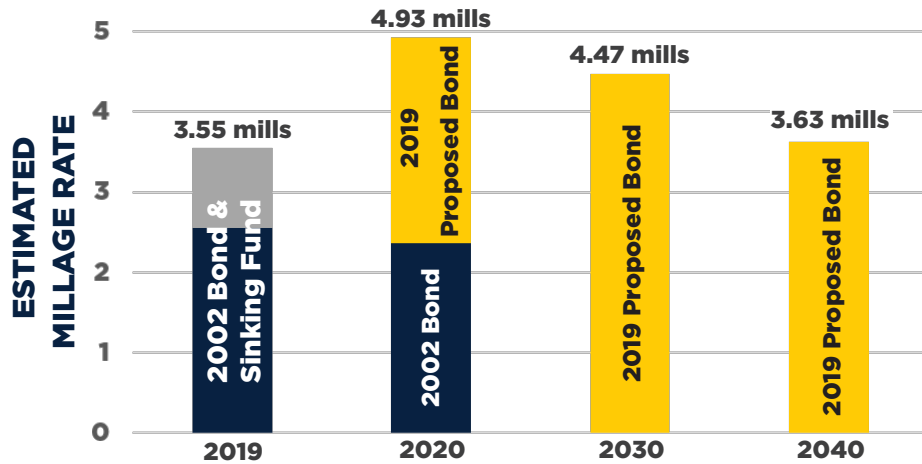


Impact of the proposed bond program

Whiteford Agricultural Schools is currently levying 2.55 mills per the 2002 Bond Program and 1.0 mills as a sinking fund. Because the final levy of the sinking fund millage will be on December 1, 2019, the new proposed bond amount is estimated to reflect a 1.38 mill net increase which would result in a net total of 4.93 mills being levied against homeowners within the community.

PROPOSED COST PER HOUSEHOLD

If approved by voters, this table illustrates the approximate additional cost per household based on the estimated increase of 1.38 mills.

Market Value of Home	Estimated Cost
\$150,000	\$8.63 per month
\$200,000	\$11.50 per month
\$250,000	\$14.38 per month

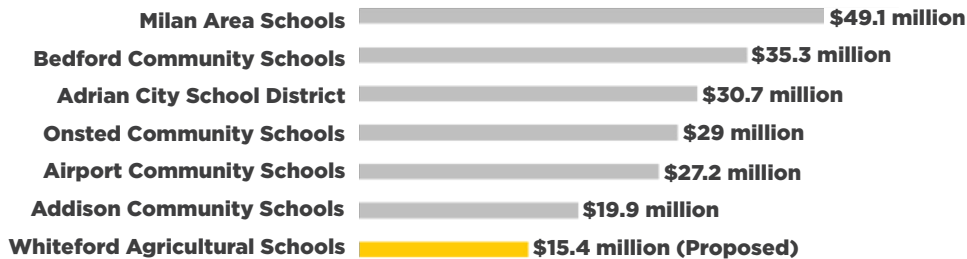
ADDRESSING SAFETY AND SECURITY
