Week 1 had a few challenges to overcome The first challenge was the weather on Friday. The snow came in fast on Friday afternoon, bringing with it an unprecedented, early noon, to the first competition day. This disrupted the normal flow of the game the first day ed the normal flow of the game the first day
and caused a change in the flow for the secand caused a change in the flow for the sec ond day. The robot brought with it some challenges of its own. Early on, it became apparent that some adjustment was needed with our arm assembly. The pit crew and coding team worked diligently to trace out the issue and repair our robot. Once the issue was resolved, our robot worked exactly the way the eam had ond highest qualifying score of the weekend
Week 2 in Lansing, our robot was ready to go from the start. Having worked out all the gremlins the week before, our Drive Team was able to consistently demonstrate that our team designed, built, and programmed a superior robot. Game after game, our team showcased the reliability of our robot, concluding the weekend with our highest ranking finish ever: $5^{\text {tin }}$ place overall and moving up to become captain of Alliance 3. We have an amazing Scouting/Strategy Team that was able to analyze all the game data that they had gathered during the qualifying rounds so our team captain could make strategic selections for which teams we would invite to join our Alliance for the playoffs. We were able to take our robot all the way to the semi-final match. Our Pit Crew tirelessly supported our robot throughout this marathon event, and our Spokesperson was able to engage with the judges that stopped by the pit several times to ask questions about our team, our community, and our robot. Because of the combined effort and consistent demonstration of excellence, our team was awarded the FIRST Autonomous Award by the judges.
Our team this year had 23 students. At competition they were divided into specific roles: Drive Team, Pit Crew, Strategy/Scouting, Safety Captain, and Spokesperson. Our team's core values were clearly evident as they worked together during the entire build season to develop the robot we brought to competition this year, and they continued to display these values as they tirelessly supported and encouraged each other, and other teams, during the long competition days. These students represented our school and our community with the highest level of integrity and professionalism, demonstrating their good character. We will miss our six seniors (Keith Gray, Kyle Gray, Mason McLaughlin, TJ French, Jaedon Diesing, and Elliot Rodgers) and wish them the best of luck as they pursue their future plans and goals.

The 2023 Season for Whiteford Bobcats, Robotics Team 6570 was the best one yet! This is our $7^{\text {th }}$ year competing in FIRST Robotics competitions. Each year the challenge presented by FIRST changes, and each year our team meets that challenge with creativity, persistence, excellence, and teamwork. This year's game challenge was CHARGED UP, presented by Haas.
The CHARGED UP competition was broken into three skills challenges:

1. Autonomous Mode: the robot executes a specific task within a set time limit, without control from a driver. Our robot would deliver a game piece to the highest level of the score zone and then drive itself to the Charge Station (a pivoting elevated platform). The robot would drive onto the platform and balance.
2. Tele-Op Mode: the robot is operated by our drive team to collect cones and cubes and deliver them to tiered levels in our alliance scoring zone. The objective is to place the cones and cubes in "links" of three game pieces in a row. Completing three-piece links will score points for the alliance. The position of the game pieces and the position of the links will determine point value. We needed to work cooperatively with our alliance members to form strategic links to earn the most points.
3. Charge Station: at the conclusion of the game, the drive team would dock and balance our robot on a platform that is mounted on a pivoting frame. The goal was to have all three of our alliance's robots balanced together on this narrow, shifting platform.
Every year, our team strives to create a robot using the methodology of being specialized, standardized, and simple. This has been a very successful engineering strategy for our team. This year, however, the team decided that they wanted to try something new. Instead of focusing on one specialized part of the game, they wanted to design and build a robot that was all encompassing; a stand-out robot that was capable of doing everything the game asked for. This was a bold goal, but this team was ready. They pulled together and worked diligently to not only design an amazing, superior robot, but they did so in only 6 short weeks, incorporating innovative designs and new technology, including our first ever swerve drive. Our team was scheduled to compete during Week 1 and Week 2 of the competition season. Week 1 of the competition was held in Jackson, MI, March 2 PAGE $10{ }^{-4}$ at Spring Arbor University. L. Frank Baum wrote The Wizard of Oz in 1900. He then adapted it into a musical by 1902. First staged in ChicaTheatre on Broadway on January 21 1903. The actual motion picture wasn't released until August 25 1939. This cinematic classic finally debuted on television on Nouember 3, 1956, as we welcomed Dorothy and her stormy Kansas escapades into our homes and hearts.
Whiteford first staged this beloved story in 2005. It would be our $3^{\text {rd }}$ musical production we brought to our Gymnatorcafetesarium/Band Room stage! 18 years later, story hasn't changed, and yet again, our 68 cast members were nothing short of pure magic.
