

### SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE...

MIDDLE SCHOOL MATTERS!! That is the theme that has guided our school improvement work at the MS/HS building over the last few years. By now, we are hoping that students and parents have noticed the emphasis that has been placed on improving the educational experience for our middle school students. Middle School (grades 6-8) is a distinct developmental phase in a child's life and the perfect time to set up kids to thrive. In her book, *Middle School Matters: the 10 key skills kids need to thrive in Middle School & Beyond – And how parents can help*, professional counselor Phyllis Fagell states, "Though the transition from childhood to adolescence can be tough for kids, this time of rapid physical, intellectual, moral, social, and emotional change is a unique opportunity to proactively build character and confidence." As educators and parents, we know that MIDDLE SCHOOL MATTERS, but what can we do to help our students understand this as well?

Our work in this area started several years ago with a data dig that confirmed for us that students struggle to see the importance of their time in middle school because credit is not awarded for the successful completion of classes as it is in the high school. The truth is that there is a high correlation between a student's middle school grade point average and their high school grade point average. This tells us that the habits students develop during their middle school years have a strong effect on their high school career. Students who have low grade point averages in middle school because they believe middle school "doesn't count", most always have a low grade point average in high school when it does count. Again, MIDDLE SCHOOL MATTERS.

Our first step was to revamp the middle school courses and give students more choice as to what courses they wanted to take. New courses such as Spanish, STEM, Genius Hour, and 21<sup>st</sup> Century Leaders were offered to students as new elective opportunities. These courses were geared toward the most desired career pathways and were created to help our students be better prepared for a future in those careers. For the first time, we also allowed middle school students to choose their courses in the same fashion as high school students, with the hopes that students would see the connection between their middle school courses and what career pathway they wanted to explore. The courses were also designed to help middle school students build character and confidence, important traits to their social emotional development.

The work did not end with elective courses. Over the past few years, instructional coaches and middle school teachers have worked together to redesign middle school Math and English courses, so they are more rigorous, aligned to state standards, and more engaging for students. Together with the Instructional Coach, Mrs. Mitchey, our 6<sup>th</sup> grade teachers, Mrs. Haley & Mr. Manley worked to evaluate the 6<sup>th</sup> grade curriculum and make changes to address the changing needs of our students. That work has paid off. Student achievement results at the 6<sup>th</sup> grade level have sky-rocketed. The 6<sup>th</sup> grade Spring 2018 MSTEP scores led the county in both Math and English and were well above the state average. Changes to the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade math curriculums have also proven to increase state assessments scores within those grade levels. Our Math Coach, Mrs. Anderson, led this work with Mr. Stevens and Mrs. Antal this past year and we are very proud of the significant improvement in their student outcomes. Mr. DeSilvis and Mr. Simmons have also worked hard to change the middle school social studies curriculum to include more literacy skills.

While students may feel that middle school is a means to end, Whiteford is working hard to change their mindset to knowing that MIDDLE SCHOOL MATTERS. Whether we are working with our students to start exploring their career pathway interests or redesigning courses to better meet their needs, we know we are doing great things at the middle school level that will have a lasting impact for our students. The skills, attitudes, and habits that students develop in middle school will set them up for success in high school. We are excited for the future of our students. Parents, please help us by continuing this message at home....MIDDLE SCHOOL MATTERS! Have a great year Bobcats!!!

### FOOD SERVICE FAQS

<u>Can my child(ren) eat breakfast at school?</u> YES; breakfast is offered daily for all students from 7:30 AM—8:00 AM in the elementary cafeteria and 7:30 AM—7:55 AM in the middle/high school cafeteria.

Where can I find the monthly menus? An interactive menu from our food service provider can be found under the Food Service tab on the district's website (OUR DISTRICT / FOOD SERVICE / then scroll down to the MONTHLY MENUS heading). The menus provide many details regarding the food items served in the district (i.e., nutritional information, allergens, etc.).

Where can I find an application for Free/Reduced Price Meals? Families are encouraged to annually submit applications for free or reduced priced meals—this includes breakfast and lunch. If you have an Internet connection available, you may find it more convenient to complete the application online at <a href="https://www.lunchapp.com">www.lunchapp.com</a>. A link to this site is available on the district's website (OUR DISTRICT / FOOD SERVICE / then scroll down to the right under the IMPORTANT LINKS heading). A paper copy of the application is also available by contacting your child's respective building office.

What is the Meal Magic® Point of Sale System? Whiteford Schools utilizes a computerized sale system for breakfast and lunch sales, which greatly benefits students, parents and staff alike. Each student has their own account and funds stay with the student until they graduate or leave the district. The most efficient use of the Meal Magic® POS system is to put money on your child's account on a regular basis to insure sufficient funds are available for all meal sales.

What happens if my child has a negative balance on their account? Students will be provided with an alternate meal that meets all established dietary requirements should they not have adequate funds to purchase a meal for the day; however, parents should note that they are responsible for the cost of any alternate meals provided to their child(ren). These balances must be paid in full as soon as possible.

How do I know if my child is in the negative or has a low balance? You can view account balances 24/7 at meal-magic.whiteford.k12.mi.us/mealmagic/mylunchaccount. The teachers and staff are ready to get the year started with a new group of students and hit the ground running!

At Whiteford Elementary School we are also excited to introduce our staff members that have joined the Bobcat Family. They include a new K-2 resource room teacher Mrs. Jennifer Floyd-Kemritz, and 2<sup>nd</sup> grade teacher Miss Lauryn Horace. These educators bring experience and enthusiasm to their new placements, and we are honored to have them on board! Students in grades kindergarten through second grade will also continually be supported in our efforts to maintain our continued high level of growth and achievement.

Students will receive a welcome letter in the mail from their new teacher for the brand new school year that indicates their classroom placement. ### NEW PLAYGROUND FOR WHITEFORD ELEMENTARY BOBCATS

The elementary playground has a new look! As the 2019-20 school year begins, there will be a new recreational area for our elementary students. A long awaited and anticipated play structure has been installed along with the previously established basketball courts, four-square, and hopscotch hard surface spots. The students will have multiple play areas within this new structure that includes slides, climbing locations, brides, swings, benches, and spaces that will spur imagination and creativity for new games, and activities. ### **New Credit Requirements for Graduation**

Whiteford Middle/High School will be moving to a block schedule for the 2019-2020 school year. This change will impact the number of credits students can earn toward a Whiteford Agricultural School diploma. Previously, students had the possibility to earn 7 credits per year needing a total of 26 credits to earn a diploma from Whiteford. With the new schedule, students will have the possibility to earn 8 credits per year. Adjustments for the credit requirements that students need to earn a diploma are listed below for graduation years 2020-2022. Beginning with this year's freshman class (Class of 2023) and all graduating classes thereafter, students will have 32 credit attempts during their four years of high school and a total of 30 credits will be required for a WHS diploma.

In preparation for these next steps, here are a few services that we will provide during this transition. Ultimately, it is critical to remember that the pathway, process, and timing for each student is different. We will continue to have conversations with every Senior about their goals, hopes, and plans for future years.

### <u>September</u>

• Meet with all Seniors and get email information for the creation of a Senior listserv. We will send all scholarship information and program information through this listserv as we receive it.

### October:

- We will host a parent night to support parents on how to fill out FAFSA (forms for federal financial aid).
- We will have numerous college admission representatives in to discuss their schools options and programs.
- We will work with our seniors to complete the student portion of the FAFSA, and apply to at least one college to ensure they know how to complete a college application.

### **December**

• We will host our annual "Mingling with Mocha" event in which we bring back former students to have open dialogue with our seniors about what their experience transitioning to their college or career.

### January:

• We will individually meet with all seniors to see what additional support or information they may need.

### April:

• Local scholarships (scholarship awards that go entirely to Whiteford students) applications are due and are awarded by our scholarship committee.

### <u>May</u>

- **Decision Day**—This is a day in which our students make a commitment to the workforce, military, trades or college path that they have selected. Family, friends, community and the Whiteford student body is invited to celebrate with the soon to be graduates.
- Graduation— May 29, 2020. Location TBA.

### **ANNUAL NOTICES**

<u>AHERA—ASBESTOS</u>: As required by the Federal Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA), this is inform you that the documentation for our District Asbestos Management Plan, the semiannual surveillance inspections (continued monitoring of remaining floor tile in our buildings) and the three-year re-inspection are available for your review in the Superintendent's Office. Information regarding response actions may also be found in the District Asbestos Management Plan.

**CONCEALED WEAPONS:** State law establishes a "Weapon-Free School Zone" that extends 1,000 feet from the boundary of any school property.

The term "weapon" means any object which, in the manner in which it is used, is intended to be used, or is represented, is capable of inflicting serious bodily harm or property damage, as well as endangering the health and safety of persons. Weapons include, but are not limited to, firearms, guns of any type, including air and gas-powered guns (whether loaded or unloaded), knives, razors, clubs, electric weapons, metallic knuckles, martial arts weapons, ammunition, and explosives.

As a School District, we have policies prohibiting the possession of weapons on school property, buildings and at school events. Obviously, weapons are not appropriate in a school environment.

These restrictions shall not apply in the following circumstances to persons who are properly licensed to carry a concealed weapon:

- A. A parent or legal guardian of a student of the school may carry a concealed weapon while in a vehicle on school property, if s/he is dropping the student off at the school or picking up the child from the school.
- B. A county corrections officer, a member of a Sheriff's posse, a police or sheriffs reserve or auxiliary officer, a State Department of Corrections parole or corrections officer, a private investigator, a Michigan State Police motor carrier officer or Capitol security officer, a State court judge, a security officer required by the employer to carry a concealed weapon while on the premises;
- C. A retired police or law enforcement officer or a retired State court judge.

These are very limited exceptions and do not change the district policy that firearms, pistols and other dangerous weapons are prohibited on school property. Parents and legal guardians are strongly discouraged from bringing concealed weapons on school property even while in a vehicle for pick-up or drop-off of their student.

We urge those individuals authorized to carry a weapon to refrain from doing so while in a vehicle in respect for the safety of our students.

PETS ON DISTRICT GROUNDS: Students play and conduct class and athletic practices on district grounds on a regular basis. Please help us keep our grounds clean and clear of pet debris by not bringing your pet on the district's grounds. ALL animals (except service animals) are prohibited from being on school property unless approved by the administration.

**SCHOOL ZONES:** Parents, student drivers and district residents are reminded of the reduced speed (25 mph) in posted "School Zones" on Consear and Sylvania-Petersburg Roads. The reduced speed is in effect from 7:30 AM—8:30 AM and 2:30 PM—3:30 PM. Fines are <u>DOUBLED</u> in these designated areas. To insure the safety of our children and those approaching the district buildings, please adhere to these speed limits.

<u>USE OF TOBACCO ON SCHOOL PREMISES</u>: In compliance with P.A. 140 of 1993, no person at anytime shall smoke, chew, or otherwise use tobacco products, of any kind, in any school building, at school sponsored events, on School District property, on property under the control of the School District, nor in School District vehicles. This policy is in effect twenty-four (24) hours a day, 365 days a year.

<u>WATER QUALITY COMPLIANCE SUMMARY</u>: Due to amendments to the Safe Drinking Water Act, 1976 PA 399, K-12 schools and day care facilities that are non-transient, non-community water supplies are required to prepare and make available for inspection an annual water quality report from the previous calendar year.

### **BULLYING POLICY AND PROCEDURE**

Any student who believes s/he has been or is the victim of bullying, hazing, or other aggressive behavior should immediately report the situation to the Principal or Dean of Student Services. The student may also report concerns to a teacher or counselor who will be responsible for notifying the appropriate administrator or Board official. Complaints against the building principal should be filed with the Superintendent. Complaints against the Superintendent should be filed with the Board President.

Every student is encouraged, and every staff member is required, to report any situation that they believe to be aggressive behavior directed toward a student. Reports shall be made to those identified above. Reports may be made anonymously, but formal disciplinary action may not be taken solely on the basis of an anonymous report.

The Principal (or other administrator as designated) shall promptly investigate and document all complaints about bullying, aggressive or other behavior that may violate this policy. The investigation must be completed as promptly as the circumstances permit.

If the investigation finds an instance of bullying or aggressive behavior has occurred, it will result in prompt and appropriate remedial action. This may include up to expulsion for students, up to discharge for employees, exclusion for parents, guests, volunteers and contractors, and removal from any official position and/or a request to resign for Board members. Individuals may also be referred to law enforcement or other appropriate officials.

The individual responsible for conducting the investigation shall document all reported incidents and report all verified incidents of bullying, aggressive or other prohibited behavior, as well as any remedial action taken, including disciplinary actions and referrals, to the Superintendent. The Superintendent shall submit a compiled report to the Board on an annual basis.

### How does this bond affect our current miliage rate?

Whiteford Agricultural Schools is currently levying 2.55 mills per the 2002 bond and 1.0 mills as a sinking fund. Because the final levy of the sinking fund millage will be on December 1, 2019, the new proposed bond amount is estimated to reflect a 1.38 mill net increase which would result in a net total of 4.93 mills being levied against homeowners within the community.
