The Whiteford Men's Cross Country team had a year of complete turnaround. This season saw great improvement as runners moved up from last in the TCC to edging its way into second, but tying for first at the championship meet, the highest and best finish in school and program history. With covid precautions put into place to keep races within state guidelines, the cross country team had to qualify for the regional meet this year. They did so by placing second at the pre-regional race on one of the hardest courses they saw all year. The following week at the regional meet they placed third, qualifying as a team for the state meet held at MIS in Brooklyn. The cross country program had experienced a five-year drought of not being represented at the state championship. The day of, state runners competed in near record-breaking high temperatures for November, but they still delivered solid performances. The team placed 19th at the meet and are already making preparations for getting back to the meet next season. The girls team was made up of 3 individuals who kept improving as the season progressed. Annabelle Gapp saw immense success as a freshman by earning 2nd team all TCC honors and qualifying for the regional race, as well. She missed qualifying for the state meet as an individual by a few spots but still had a great race and season. Some quick highlights and accolades earned: The team brought home their first ever trophy. Boys: Luke Murphy-First Team TCC, All Region; Keegan Masters-First Team TCC, All Region; Elliott Rodgers-Second Team TCC; Cole Crouch-Second Team TCC; Ryan Oberle-TCC Honorable Mention. Girls: Annie Gapp-Second Team TCC.





School Meals in School Year 2020-2021

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) free meal program scheduled to expire on 12/31/2020 has been extended to children for the remainder of the 2020-2021 school year.

The USDA allows for free breakfast and lunch meals to be provided to any child age 18 and under regardless of how learning is planned (remote, hybrid, or in-person) under the extended summer food service program.

Details for Whiteford's program include:

Non-congregate meals that allow for meals to be served to students on or off campus.

• For those students learning remotely or when a temporary school closure is in place, see the district's website under News & Announcements to place your children's names on the list for meal pickup. -

• Meal pickup is available once per week; pickup will include meals for multiple days. See the district's website at any time under News & Announcements for the most current details.
