# **OCTOBER IS COLLEGE MONTH**

October has become College Application Month across the state of Michigan. This was done to emphasize the importance of post-secondary planning for our high school Seniors. The next steps for our graduates include numerous pathways such as, but not limited to, attending 2 year or 4 year Colleges and Universities, going into the military, attending trade school, or entering the work force. With the challenges of Covid-19, it is our objective to continue to work with students to ensure that they are aware of the opportunities that exist and what they need to do in order to accomplish their goals. Ken Groch, Jennifer Head, and I will be working with small groups of students during their W.I.N. periods to help them complete the student portion of the FAFSA as well as complete at least one application to a trade school, college, or connect the student with a Military Recruiter depending on the student's goals. After this is completed we will work with a local university to have a representative of their financial aide department host a zoom call to help answer any questions students may have with regards to the completion of FAFSA and learn more about how financial assistance is available for our college bound students. We will reach out to our Seniors who are learning virtually this year by phone to try and ensure their questions are answered and they know how to complete the FAFSA and apply for a college or trade school.

SAT Testing

On October 14<sup>th</sup>, our students who lost out on the chance to take the PSAT or SAT last year due to the stay at home order and Covid-19 will be provided the opportunity to take these assessments. Fortunately the state decided that all our students will be able to take these important assessments this fall.

12th Grade will take SAT with Essay

The spring testing will continue as it has been traditionally offered. We are thankful our students will be able to take these tests on site as many of the students understand the importance of our college entrance scores.

er, has spear-headed this endeavor. She is Derby's main handler on Whiteford's campus and also cares for Derby at home.



## STUDENT ATHLETICS IN 2020

As with all things, 2020 has brought unforeseen challenges to our Athletic Programs. Some rules that have been put in place by the State of Michigan to ensure safety are the following:

- 1. Facial coverings must be worn by all spectators, athletes, and coaches always.
- 2. Social distancing should always be maintained by spectators and athletes when possible.
- 3. Tickets and passes are not accepted at this time; instead each participant can have two guests attend in support of their athletes. Athletes are provided vouchers prior to each game to give to their guests.
