## FOUNDERS DAY

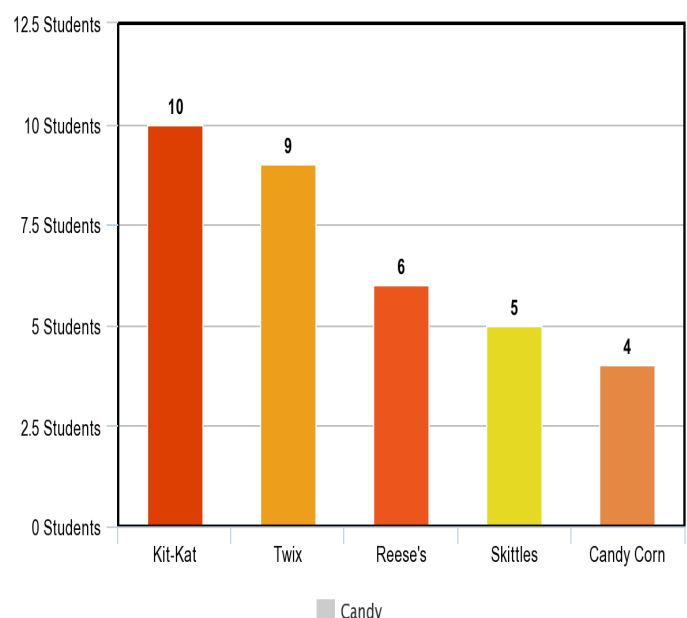

RECIPE: TOASTED PUMPKIN SEEDS

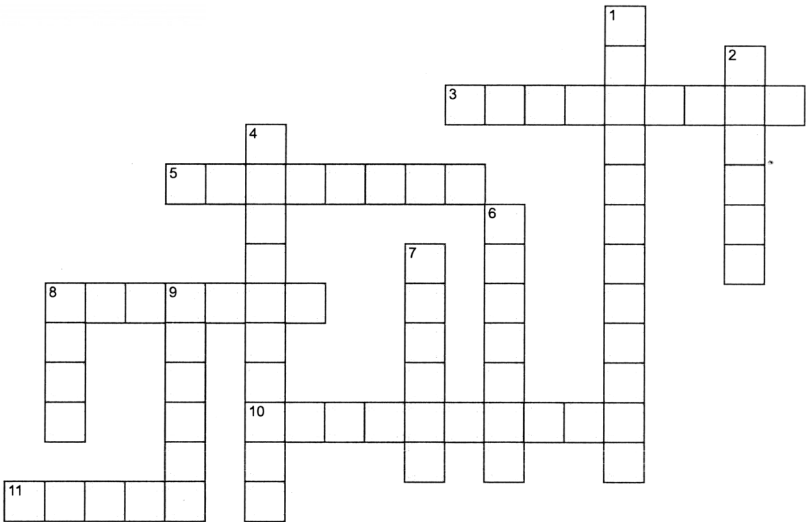
Ingredients:  
Seeds from one pumpkin  
1 tablespoon olive oil  
Salt and pepper

Recipe Preparation:

Scrape seeds and any attached fibers from pumpkin using a large metal spoon. Place seeds in a colander and rinse well to help separate seeds from fibers. Set seeds aside. Cook seeds in a medium saucepan of boiling, salted water until they begin to look translucent, about 5-7 minutes. Drain and transfer to a paper towel-lined baking sheet; pat well to dry. Preheat oven to 425°. Spread seeds on a rimmed baking sheet, toss with olive oil, and season with salt and pepper. Roast until golden and crisp, about 12-15 minutes. Let cool completely.

After seasoning seeds with olive oil, salt, and pepper, toss with one of the following combinations:  
1/2 tsp. each turmeric and chile powder  
1 tsp. Za'atar and 1/2 tsp. finely grated lemon zest  
1/2 tsp. Aleppo pepper, 1/2 tsp. ground cumin  
1/2 tsp. ground Szechuan peppercorns  
1 Tbsp. sugar and 1/4 tsp. cinnamon

**NEW STAFF**

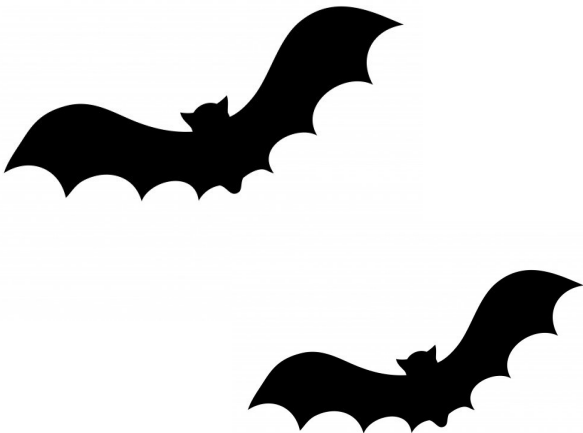
